HOLDING THE GOVERNMENT TO ACCOUNT

MORE JOBS LESS LOGS

On the Burnie wharf in January last year Kim exposed how Forestry Tasmania was wasting millions of tonnes of high grade timber.

Forestry Tasmania (FT) says one of its significant revenue streams is its export of whole logs. What they don't say is that their business model lost them \$35 million last year. Meanwhile, their flawed grading process means quality timber is sold for pulp prices. Logs that FT insists are cheap 'pulp grade' are frequently millable, high value speciality timber. And every log that is exported costs the Tasmanian Taxpayer.


It's time for different thinking. A real solution in our forest industry being trialled right now is to use timber rejected by FT to produce high quality timber products. Forestry Tasmania says it can't be done. Kim Booth has proved it can be done.
